Walter Brueggermann in his book, <u>Spirituality of the Psalms</u>, gives us a helpful framework in categorizing the Psalms. He says there are Psalms of orientation, disorientation and new orientation.

Orientation

Psalms of orientation describe a happy, blessed state, where God is known to be reliable and trustworthy. They express a confident, serene view. God is good, his creation is perfect, Torah is complete and ordered - everything is good. These Psalms speak of a healthy, oriented life that is anticipated even if it is not yet experienced.

Disorientation

Psalms of disorientation acknowledge that life is not always that of coherence and symmetry. In fact, sometimes life is very difficult and it does not make sense. These Psalms address brokenness, suffering, disarray, and evoke rage and pity. They express a dissatisfaction with God and question when God will act. This are also called Psalms of Lament and it is estimated roughly half the Psalms fall into this category

New or Reorientation

These Psalms express a return to orientation - although there is no going back. In these Psalms, the Psalmist recognizes that God has met them in the place of orientation. God has shown up. Things have changed. Hope has been found in the darkness. God has rescued the people. Grace has been exhibited. Even in the darkest hour, God is still God and God is good.

Life is lived in the movement between these areas - mainly between disorientation and new orientation. It is our reality. The Church does a poor job with those in disorientation. It is not a comfortable place for any involved. We want to move people to new orientation as quickly as possible. Sometimes it is necessary for people to hang out in disorientation for a while. Sometimes it takes time.
