Revelation 4:1-11

With each election cycle, we may not be able to predict who will win and occupy the White House or "thrones" of government and power. But we do know our God sits on His Throne in Heaven and is Ruler of all! Revelation 4 takes us into the throne room of heaven.

(Rev 4:1) After this I looked, and behold, a door standing open in heaven! And the first voice, which I had heard speaking to me like a trumpet, said, "Come up here, and I will show you what must take place after this." 2 At once I was in the Spirit, and behold, a throne stood in heaven, with one seated on the throne. 3 And he who sat there had the appearance of jasper and carnelian, and around the throne was a rainbow that had the appearance of an emerald. 4 Around the throne were twenty-four thrones, and seated on the thrones were twenty-four elders, clothed in white garments, with golden crowns on their heads. 5 From the throne came flashes of lightning, and rumblings and peals of thunder, and before the throne were burning seven torches of fire, which are the seven spirits of God, 6 and before the throne there was as it were a sea of glass, like crystal.

And around the throne, on each side of the throne, are four living creatures, full of eyes in front and behind: 7 the first living creature like a lion, the second living creature like an ox, the third living creature with the face of a man, and the fourth living creature like an eagle in flight. 8 And the four living creatures, each of them with six wings, are full of eyes all around and within, and day and night they never cease to say, "Holy, holy, holy, is the Lord God Almighty, who was and is and is to come!" 9 And whenever the living creatures give glory and honor and thanks to him who is seated on the throne, who lives forever and ever, 10 the twenty-four elders fall down before him who is seated on the throne and worship him who lives forever and ever. They cast their crowns before the throne, saying, 11 "Worthy are you, our Lord and God, to receive glory and honor and power, for you created all things, and by your will they existed and were created."

Q: When have you been most aware of the awesome power and holy majesty of God (perhaps in the midst of a trial, or after one)?	Q:	How is God the Holy Spirit described? (see Zech 4:2-6)
Q: John is taken up to heaven "in the Spirit." What does he then describe?	Q:	How are the four living creatures described? How do these descriptions compare with those in Isa 6:1-5 and Ezek 1:5-10? How might each reflect the attributes (quality and characteristics) of God?
Q: How difficult would it be to describe the glory of God?! How does John describe the One seated on the throne?	Q:	What do all these descriptions imply about who God is and how He relates to His creation? What is the significance to you, that God reveals Himself here as Holy, Mighty, Sovereign, in control of all creation, including your problems too?
*(among other colorful descriptions is the rainbow, a reminder and symbol of God's faithfulness (Gen 9:12-17). Q: (v.4) Who surrounds the throne and whom might they represent? (for OT significance of the #24, see 1 Chron 24:1-19; 1 Chron 25). How might they represent God's people from all time (believing Jews and Gentiles)? (See also 1 Pet 2:9; Rev 1:6; 5:10).	Q:	How do these four angelic beings elicit worship of our God? Notice they worship God highlighting of utmost importance, His holiness. What is it about God's holiness that draws us to worship Him?
