In Chapter 6, Jesus opens the first 6 seals, (see Matt 24) unleashing God's initial set of judgements for those who reject Christ. (keep in mind, God's wrath is NOT for followers of Christ (1 Thes 1:10; 5:9;

Rev 3:10; 9:4). Here in chapter 7, we get an heavenly interlude, highlighting God's protection and sealing of His followers, those saved by His grace through faith in Jesus. Our Sovereign God is in total control of all these events that must take place. God keeps His promises! All heaven erupts with praise to God!			
Describe a time you were a part of a multitude of people, all with a common purpose or goal? (maybe a professional sporting event, a concert, etc.) What thoughts and emotions did you experience? Why?			
(vv.1-3) What authority was given to the 4 angels? What had to happen before they could carry out their assignment?			
(v.3) Who was to receive the seal of God (i.e. the King's mark on their foreheads; showing protection and ownership—believers belong to Christ!)? Could this be physical seal (like in Gen 4:15; Ezek 9:4-6), or symbolic of the Holy Spirit's life-changing presence (Dt 6: 1-9; Eph 1:13-14) or both?

Q: In Rev 6:16-17, those who rejected Christ called on the rocks to fall on them and hide them from "Him who sits on the throne and from the wrath of the Lamb (Jesus). For the great day of their wrath has come, and who can stand?" Now in 7:9, <i>who</i> is able to stand!!? What qualifies them to <i>stand</i> , holy and redeemed before God? What does this say about God's Kingdom and Christ's atoning sacrifice?
*some say the 144,000 represents actual Jewish descendants who come to trust in Christ and serve God as His witnesses during the tribulation Q: Describe some similarities and differences of other lists of the "12 Tribes of Israel." (There are 20 of them! But here are a few to considerGen 35:23-26; Gen 46 & 49; Num 1:1-54). Some say this arraignment of names is similar to Num 2, before Israel would go and conquer the Promised Land.	Q: How would this scene encourage the persecuted church, whom John was originally writing this book to (Rev 2-3)? How does this give you greater appreciation, hope and confidence in Christ today, not only for what He has done in your life, but also for what trials you may currently be going through (or those you may face in the future)?
Q: Why might the tribe of Dan be missing in this list? (see Judges 18; 1 Kings 12:29-30). Also, why might Joseph's son Ephraim also be missing from this list? (see Hosea 5:9,11 & Isa 7—The idolatrous Northern Kingdom was also referred as "Ephraim"). What could John be stating by leaving these two names out?
